



**Charlevoix United Methodist Church/Drawbridge Life**  
**Northern Skies District**  
**Charlevoix, Michigan**

Final Worship October 1, 2023

Date of Closure December 31, 2023

(Voted at November 30, 2023 Special Session of Annual Conference)

A Methodist class was organized on the Charlevoix Circuit in the summer of 1867 with 17 members. By 1878 the class had grown into a church with a new building. Its steeple was, for a time, the tallest structure in Charlevoix. Through the next 145 years, the church grew to become an integral part of its community. From Easter Sunrise Services on the shores of Lake Charlevoix, to baptisms in Lake Michigan, to the free lunch program offered for many years from the church, members and friends worked to learn about and grown in their faith and share their love of Jesus with those around them. Ministries included the lunch program, the Rainbow Thrift Shoppe, Kids Hope, work trips to Henderson Settlement in Kentucky, the community Christmas program, and hosting the Charlevoix Thanksgiving dinner. Popular fundraisers drew many hungry customers – the footlong hotdog booth at the Venetian Festival, soup and salad luncheons sponsored by the UMW, chili cookoffs, and famous fish fries. The closing worship was celebrated on October 1, 2023. Furnishings and supplies were donated to churches and ministries near and far; all properties were sold. Throughout the process of closing, members have celebrated the ways in which their faith strengthened their love of God, their lives, and their friendships, and know that it will continue the legacy of Charlevoix UMC in the community for many years to come.

**Leonard United Methodist Church

Years ago, Circuit Riders from the Union Circuit, organized in 1858, came on horseback to preach in Addison Township, wherever a gathering place was available. In 1886 about one half acre of land was purchased from Leonard Rowland by the following trustees of the Leonard Class of the Union Circuit: Jacob Snyder, Norman Haines, and Samuel B. Cooley.

At that time, lighting was by kerosene lamps over each window, giving place to gas light generated from gasoline, lighted manually but very carefully, as can be well imagined. Parking was not as is in present day living with parking meters, but horse stalls in the back of the lot were rented out to the parishioners. Some of the charter members were from the Myers, Glover, Parrish, Goodwin and Stuffel families.

The church still used the original furniture, pulpit, altar rail, and pews. The Bible on the pulpit was an 1864 edition which included the names of circuit members initiated in those early years. From Leonard Methodist Protestant Church, to Leonard Methodist Church (1939) to Leonard United Methodist Church (1968), this congregation continued to serve her Lord. The spirit of Leonard UMC will live on.

**Rodney United Methodist Church  
Central Bay District,  
Rodney, Michigan**

The story of the Rodney United Methodist Church is the story of the village of Rodney, which was founded in Mecosta County in 1879 by the Hood & Gale Lumber Company as a station along the Detroit, Lansing & Northern Railroad in Colfax Township. Later, the railroad became part of the Pere Marquette Railway.

The town is located eight miles east of Big Rapids and was a branch line that headed north to Chippewa Lake. As with most towns in that area in the 1800's it was a lumber and farming town. It didn't take long for the town to soon have a billiard hall, general store, the Rodney House Hotel, livestock yards, livery stable, and post office, along with the railroad depot.

In 1882, the Sweet Lumber Company generously donated land to the village of Rodney, initiating the establishment of a Congregational Church under the leadership of Reverend Carey. By 1890, followers of John Wesley's teachings had constructed the Rodney Methodist Episcopal Church right next door. The original Congregational Church became vacant by 1912, but in 1924, under the leadership of District Superintendent Reverend J. C. Devinney, the Rodney Methodist Episcopal congregation acquired and moved into this larger building, marking a significant moment in their history.

As with many small towns in Michigan, when the lumber boom ended and the work dried up, so did the towns. That was the story of the Village of Rodney, and of the Rodney United Methodist Church. Rodney United Methodist Church, alongside Third Ave and Paris United Methodist Churches, was an integral part of the Big Rapids Parish from 1948 until its closure on March 1, 2024.

In a display of remarkable faith, the congregation of Rodney made the difficult decision to discontinue use of their historic building due to significant structural issues. Recognizing the challenges that maintaining the aging building would pose for the newly forming ministry in Mecosta County, they chose not to become a burden. Instead, they were resolute in their willingness to let go of the old to make way for new growth. This selfless act is a testament to their deep commitment to their faith and their community, embodying a spirit of renewal that respects their cherished past while embracing the future's possibilities.
