


SERVICE OF RECOGNITION
COMMISSIONING AND ORDINATION





Greetings in the grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God and the peace and power of the Holy Spirit. Welcome to this unique and beautiful worship service.

"Ministry in the Christian church is derived from the ministry of Christ, who calls all persons to receive God's gift of salvation and follow in the way of love and service.... Within the church community, there are persons whose gifts, evidence of God's grace, and promise of future usefulness are affirmed by the community, and who respond to God's call by offering themselves in leadership as setapart ministers, ordained and licensed" (The Book of Discipline of The United Methodist Church, ¶ 301). These words are rooted in our Scriptures. In his letter to the church at Ephesus, Paul writes, "He gave some apostles, some prophets, some evangelists, and some pastors and teachers. His purpose was to equip God's people for the work of serving and building up the body of Christ until we all reach the unity of faith and knowledge of God's Son. God's goal is for us to become mature adults — to be fully grown, measured by the standard of the fullness of Christ" (Ephesians 4:11-13, Common English Bible).

We gather in worship to affirm those whom God has called into setapart ministry, who have been examined by the church, and found to have the gifts and graces the church needs as it seeks to be in ministry for and with Jesus Christ. As your bishop it is my great joy and privilege to place my hands and offer my hands to those being licensed, commissioned, and ordained, in the tradition of bishops who came before me. Every bishop, in offering hands, symbolically offers God's Spirit and the tradition of the Church, the Church which exists to make disciples of Jesus Christ so that lives will be different and the world will be different.

A unique dimension to ordination services in The United Methodist Church is that they happen when we are gathered at Annual Conference. Here we acknowledge our connection with one another in ministry. The ministry of the church belongs to all God's people, not just the clergy, yet we believe that to be the church and help one another mature in Christ, we need leaders called by God. At provisional membership, ordination or licensing, persons become members of the Annual Conference. Together, lay and clergy leaders alike, work together so that we might all grow up into mature adulthood in faith and together fearlessly follow in the way of love and service set out for us by Jesus Christ.

As we celebrate those newly commissioned, licensed, recognized, and ordained, may we all hear God's call anew to be God's people, together in ministry to a world desperately in need of more love, more justice, more care, more tenderness, more courage, more kindness, and more beauty.

Welcome to this significant service of worship and celebration of ministry. This evening we will recognize, commission and ordain those whom God has called into the leadership of the church. All that we do is anchored in the sacrament of baptism and the ministry of all baptized persons. We invite you to participate fully and pray that the Holy Spirit will work within you as we offer praise and thanksgiving to God for gathering, empowering and sending us to be the body and do the work of Christ.

Commissioned as Deacons and Elders

Commissioning relates persons to the ministry of the provisional members within the annual conference. In it, we acknowledge and affirm God's call and the individual's gifts and training for leadership in the local church. We offer our support for their continuing formation as they journey toward ordination and full membership. Those preparing for ordination as elders and serving local congregations are licensed and authorized for sacramental and pastoral duties. Those preparing for ordination as deacons are licensed and authorized for their appropriate specialized ministries.

Ordination of Deacons and Elders


Ordination is understood as the act of the Holy Spirit. As a liturgical act, it is the culmination of a process in which representatives of the whole Church discern and validate the call, gifts and effectiveness for ministry of those being ordained. Ordination of deacons and elders is both to an office and for a lifetime. It confers a new identity in the life of the church as well as authority for ministry. Upon ordination, deacons and elders become accountable to the whole church, to the community of the ordained, and to the order of deacons or elders of which they are a part. The ministry of the deacon is to teach and to form disciples, to lead worship together with other ordained and lay persons, conduct marriages and bury the dead, and lead the congregation in interpreting the needs and hopes of the world. Deacons exemplify Christian discipleship and create opportunities for others to enter into discipleship. The ministry of the elder is expressed by leading the people of God in worship and prayer, by leading persons to faith in Jesus Christ, by exercising pastoral supervision in the congregation, and by leading the Church in obedience to mission in the world.



THE GENERAL EXAMINATION

Will you be faithful to The United Methodist Church, accepting and upholding its order, liturgy, doctrine, and discipline, defending them against all doctrines contrary to God's Holy Word, and committing yourself to be accountable with those serving with you, and to the bishop and those who are appointed to supervise your ministry?

Will you, for the sake of the Church's life and mission, covenant to participate in the life of the order into which you are commissioned, recognized or ordained?

Will you give yourself to God through the order, in order to sustain and build each other up in prayer, study, worship and service under the rule of life set forth in the vows you take this day?

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE UMC IN THE UNITED STATES

In 1735, the Wesley brothers, John and Charles, sailed to Savannah, Georgia to minister to the colonialists and teach the Gospel to Native American tribes. After returning to England in 1737, John Wesley had an experience he described as an 'infilling of the Holy Spirit.' He soon after formed Methodist societies.

In 1784, John began ordaining ministers for America. He sent Thomas Coke to America where he and Francis Asbury founded the Methodist Episcopal Church, which was to later establish itself as the largest denomination in America during the 19th century.

Methodism thrived in America thanks to the First and Second Great Awakenings beginning in the 1700s. In 1939, many of the splintered Methodist groups joined together to form The Methodist Church USA. Another merger in 1968 resulted in the formation of The United Methodist Church from the Evangelical United Brethren (EUB) and the Methodist Church.

Today, The United Methodist Church has over 12 million members worldwide with more than 14,000 congregations. The Michigan Conference, formed from the Detroit Annual Conference and the West Michigan Conference began operating as one community on January 1, 2019. Today, the Michigan Conference serves 592 local churches across the state with over 105,000 professing members.



BISHOP DAVID ALAN BARD

David Alan Bard is the presiding bishop of the Michigan Conference of The United Methodist Church. He has served in that role since 2016. From 2021-2022, he also served the Minnesota Annual Conference as interim bishop and as the President of the North Central Jurisdiction College to Bishops from 2017 – 2023. He is currently a member of the Council of Bishops Anti-Racism Task Force.

For more than 30 years, Bishop Bard pastored local churches in the Minnesota Conference from Roseau to the Iron Range, and just prior to his election as bishop, as the Senior Pastor of First United Methodist Church in Duluth, Minnesota, the community where he grew up. 1998-2005, he served as the Minnesota Conference Northwest District Superintendent. Within the Minnesota Conference, Bishop Bard was chair of the Episcopacy Committee and the Higher Education Ministry Team, served on the Board of Ordained Ministry and the Congregational Response Team, as conference parliamentarian, and for three years on the Commission on Religion and Race. Bishop Bard was a General and Jurisdictional Conference delegate in 2000, 2004, 2008, and 2012, and an episcopal nominee in 2004 and 2008.

Bishop Bard was recently elected chairperson of the Committee on Faith and Order in the General Church. He has served on the General Board of Higher Education and Ministry, the Commission on General Conference, the Commission on Theological Education, the Study on Ministry Commission, and the North Central Jurisdiction Committee on the Episcopacy.

Bishop Bard is a graduate of the University of Minnesota Duluth (B.A. cum laude, philosophy and psychology), United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities (M.Div.), and has a Ph.D. in Religious Studies with a concentration in Christian Ethics from Southern Methodist University, Dallas, Texas. He has taught courses at The College of St. Scholastica, Duluth, MN, and United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities as an adjunct faculty member. Among the courses he taught are United Methodist History and Polity, Religious Perspectives in Living, Dying and Grieving and Religious Perspectives on Health Care Ethics. In August of 2021, Bishop Bard received the Distinguished Alum Award from his alma mater, United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities.

Bishop Bard married his wife, Julie, also from Duluth, in 1982. Julie is a long-time educator. Together, they have three adult children – David L., Elizabeth (Michael), and Sarah (Aaron), as well as two adorable grandchildren, Henry and Eleanora.
